

## District Councillor Report – Palgrave Parish Council – March 2025

<p><b>Full Council - Annual Budget</b></p>	<p>Full Council of Mid Suffolk District Council on 27<sup>th</sup> February approved the Council’s Annual Budget for 2025/26. Details can be found here: <a href="#">(Public Pack)Agenda Document for Mid Suffolk Council, 27/02/2025 17:30</a>. Highlights as follows:</p> <p><b>No increase in Council Tax:</b> The Council Tax bill for a Band D property remains at £175.03. That works out under £3.37 a week to cover all district council services, including waste collection, licensing, planning, public realm and supporting the local economy, culture and communities. (Council Tax overall is expected to rise, however, as MSDC only sets and receives a small portion, with the bulk going to the County Council.)</p> <p><b>MSDC expects a budget surplus of £2.4m in 2025/26:</b> This is down from last year, due to factors including rising employee costs, costs for services, and discontinuation of the government’s Rural Services Delivery Grant.</p> <p><b>Capital programme agreed:</b> The Council committed to a capital programme of £36.3m (£26m committed, with another £10m proposed ‘capital ambition’ projects), partly funded from reserves. This will deliver an ambitious pipeline of projects across the district.</p> <p>Among other things, expenditure includes:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Investment in sports and health facilities in Stowmarket and in Stradbroke (with a £540k investment in Stradbroke’s leisure centre.)</li> <li>• Major investment in the new Skills and Innovation Centre to upskill the District</li> <li>• £1.5m fund to support High Street regeneration in our largest town, Stowmarket</li> <li>• £300k per year funding pot for projects in other market towns and rural communities</li> <li>• Investment in cycling and walking infrastructure</li> <li>• Increase in the Locality Award to £10,000 per Ward, giving an annual total of £340,000 in Locality grants to fund smaller projects around the District</li> <li>• Ongoing support for range of other grant schemes to fund community projects.</li> </ul>
<p><b>Local Government Reorganisation</b></p>	<p>As noted in the last report, the government has announced major changes to the way local government is organised. This includes the creation of new mayoral strategic authorities, and dissolution of District and County Councils into unitary authorities.</p> <p>In January, Suffolk County Council voted to enter the ‘fast track’ version of these changes. The government accepted this, resulting in the cancellation of the May 2025 County Council elections.</p> <p><b>Mayoral authorities – the government has opened a consultation until April 13<sup>th</sup>.</b> To share your views, see: <a href="https://www.gov.uk/government/consultations/norfolk-and-suffolk-devolution/norfolk-and-suffolk-devolution-consultation">https://www.gov.uk/government/consultations/norfolk-and-suffolk-devolution/norfolk-and-suffolk-devolution-consultation</a></p> <p><b>Creation of unitary authorities:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Initial plans are to be sent to the government by 21st March 2025.</li> <li>• MSDC is concerned about the lack of public consultation on this aspect of the reforms.</li> <li>• An Extraordinary meeting of Mid Suffolk and Babergh Councils to discuss the issues was rescheduled from Feb 10<sup>th</sup> to April 10<sup>th</sup> to allow more time to review emerging details from government.</li> </ul>
<p><b>Planning Policy updates</b></p>	<p>As noted in the last report, the Joint Local Plan (JLP) for Babergh and Mid Suffolk is being reviewed, to make sure it stays compliant with the government’s increased new targets for housebuilding. The timeline for this work was approved at the February Full Council</p>

Further information can be found here: <a href="#">babergh-and-mid-suffolk-joint-local-plan-review</a></p> <p>The Cabinet member for Heritage, Planning and Infrastructure, Cllr Andrew Stringer, has highlighted the importance of Neighbourhood Plans, which form part of the district's local plans.</p>
<b>EcoPower Suffolk: solar application</b>	<p>EcoPower Suffolk (a subsidiary of Eenergy International Ltd) has announced plans for a 600 ha solar project in our area: <a href="https://ecopowersuffolk.com/">https://ecopowersuffolk.com/</a></p> <p>The project includes parcels of land along the B1077 between Occold and Eye, and around Brome Avenue (Eye), as well as several other villages.</p> <p>Because of the project's size, it is classified as a National Strategic Infrastructure Project (NSIP), and so the government (not the Local Authority) will decide if it goes ahead.</p> <p>The <b>first consultation period will run from 10 March to 22 April 2025. <b>New way to reach the District Council in Eye</b>	<p>From March, you'll be able to drop in to Eye Library on Fridays to get help from Council staff.</p> <p>MSDC is opening its first joint customer-access point at Eye Library, alongside Mid Suffolk Citizens Advice, starting 28th March. Staff from both organisations will be on hand to help residents between 9.15am and 12pm every Friday.</p> <p>This aims to make life easier for residents who prefer face-to-face contact. <b>Blister Pack Recycling</b>	<p>Medicine blister packs are a difficult to recycle product and should not be placed in the recycling bin. Some pharmacies offer limited collection points, often requiring you make a purchase or download an app to dispose of small volumes of materials. MSDC has launched a pilot project to recycle blister packs free of charge at three locations across the district. Palgrave Community Centre is one of the host locations. Whenever the Community Centre is open to the public the container is available for your use for completely empty blister packs only Any unused medicines should be returned to a pharmacy for safe disposal..</p>
